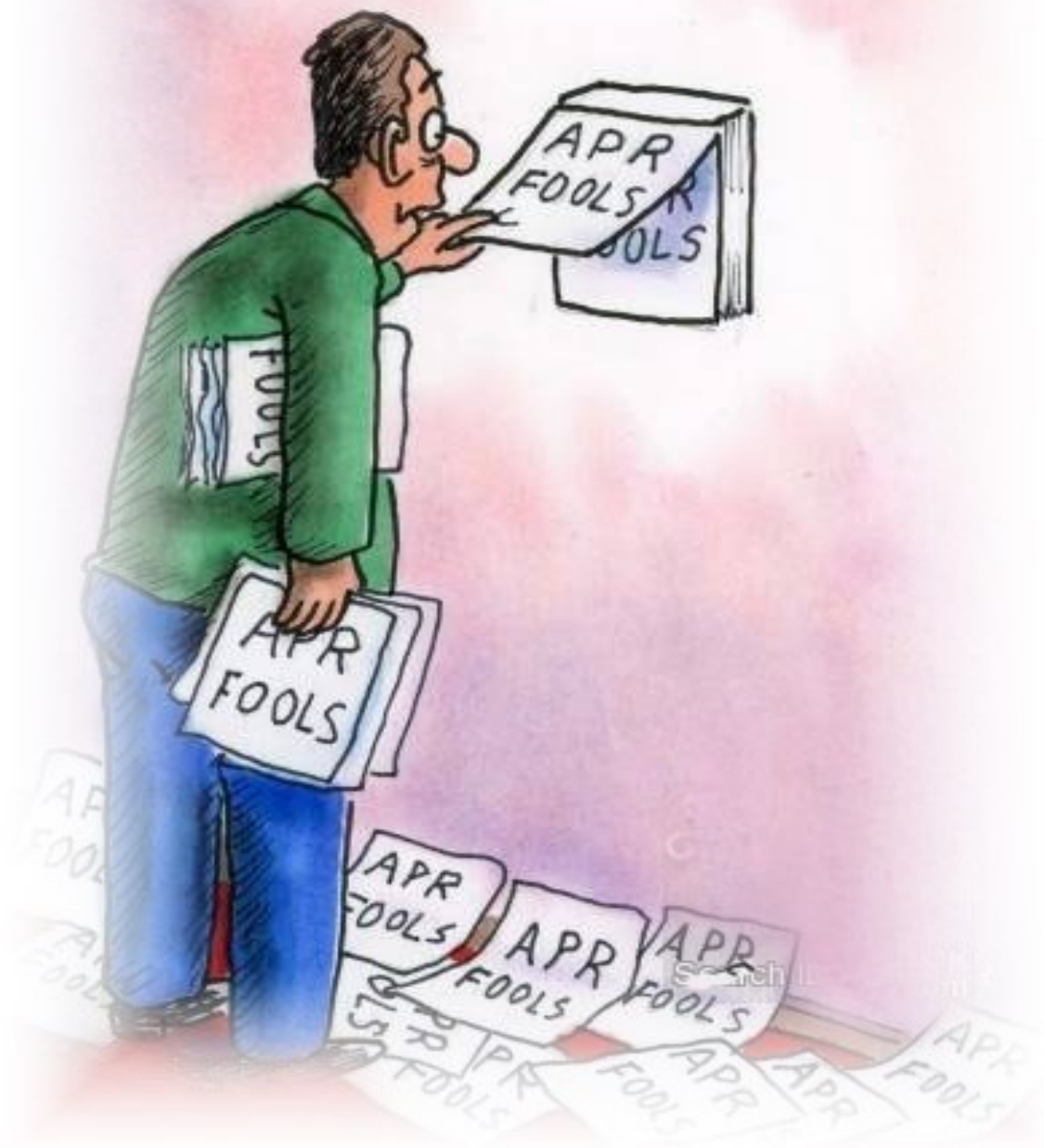

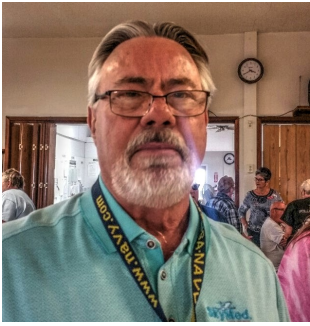

Google knows everything and this is what it says about April Fools Day!

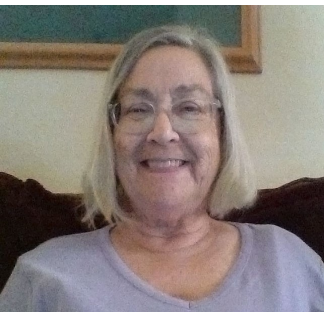

Did you know?

OVER A BARREL In the days before CPR a drowning victim would be placed face down over a barrel and the barrel would be rolled back and forth in an effort to empty the lungs of water. It was rarely effective. If you are over a barrel you are in deep trouble.

BARGE IN Heavy freight was moved along the Mississippi in large barges pushed by steamboats. These were hard to control and would sometimes swing into piers or other boats. People would say they "barged in".

BARRELS OF OIL When the first oil wells were drilled they had made no provision for storing the liquid so they used water barrels. That is why, to this day, we speak of barrels of oil rather than gallons.

SHOWBOAT These were floating theatres built on a barge that was pushed by a steamboat. These played small towns along the Mississippi River . Unlike the boat shown in the movie "Showboat" these did not have an engine. They were gaudy and attention grabbing which is why we say someone who is being the life of the party is "showboating".

HOT OFF THE PRESS As the paper goes through the rotary printing press friction causes it to heat up. Therefore, if you grab the paper right off the press it's hot. The expression means to get immediate information.

CURFEW The word "curfew" comes from the French phrase "couvre-feu", which means "cover the fire". It was used to describe the time of blowing out all lamps and candles. It was later adopted into Middle English as "curfeu" which later became the modern "curfew". In the early American colonies homes had no real fireplaces so a fire was built in the centre of the room. In order to make sure a fire did not get out of control during the night it was required that, by an agreed upon time, all fires would be covered with a clay pot called-a "curfew".

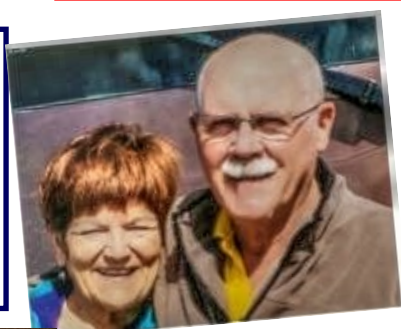


Marge will be busy most of the summer volunteering at the hospital

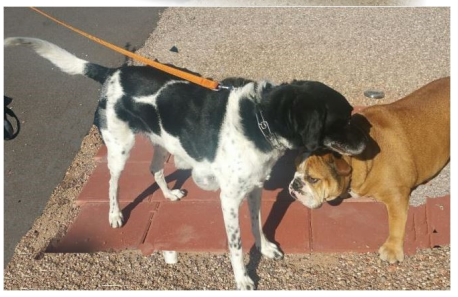
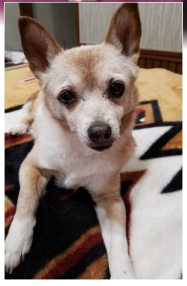

In and Around Casa Grande

Lucid announced its plans to build a manufacturing center in Casa Grande to build luxury electric cars in 2016. Finding funding delayed the construction of the plant and took longer than expected. Lucid has now received an infusion of cash from the Saudi Investment Fund.

Where is this new plant going to be built? Well, just down the road from RoVer's Roost. Lucid plans to break ground on the manufacturing plant this spring or early summer on a 500-acre site on the southwest corner of Thornton and Peters roads. The electric cars would "launch" in 2020. Lucid has said it plans to employ up to 2,000 workers at a car manufacturing facility. It is expected that many other businesses will also move to Casa Grande as a result of the new plant.



Attesa a large motor sports park is set to break ground in August on 2,400 acres located right off of Montgomery Rd and the I8. The primary track is to be used for vehicle and component research, development and testing, plus major racing events. The membership track is to feature a luxury club including swimming pool, spa and fitness center, driver's lounge and locker room. Attesa also plans residential and industrial districts, an airpark and private air strip plus a multi-use area suitable for large concerts, closed course off-road races and other events.

The Attesa project includes two racetracks, a multiuse facility, parking for 14,000 vehicles, and other amenities including a hotel and residential housing.

What will this do to RoVer's Roost and the property values? We don't even have to guess. We know what it will do.

Dreamport has plans to completely revamp the southern portion of Casa Grande between I10 and I8 with a theme park, conference center, extreme motorsports complex and a mix of residential and commercial buildings. Dreamport Villages, including a Disney-like theme park on 2,000 acres, has its zoning in place but is also trying to raise money. Will this happen? That we will know when it actually happens.

Another major project in Casa Grande is just east of the I10. It is Phoenixmart. Construction has slowed due to funding issues. However, it is believed the project will move on.

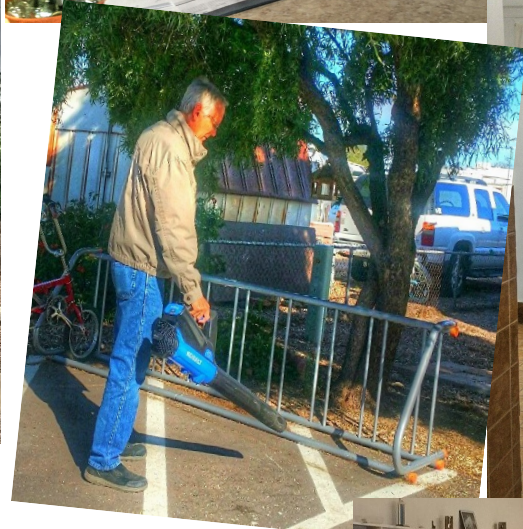

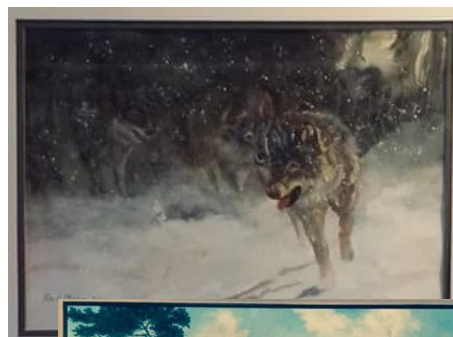

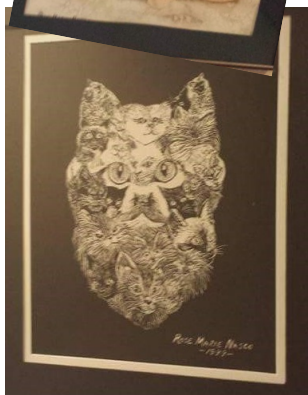

Alaska — Cruise Ship vs Ferry

A thought for summer travel

One doesn't normally think of a ferry when they think of cruising the inside passage to Alaska. That's what I had wanted to do for years and so we finally did. We've done lots of cruises but mainly on small ships. We had no intention of being on a big cruise ship with a few thousand people.

We packed our little roller bags and headed to the airport for the first part of our trip on the Alaska Marine Highway. Roller bags? That's how we've traveled across Europe and Asia so knew it'd work for Alaska too. I'm always amazed at the amount of clothes people think they need to take.



Being on a ferry and not a cruise ship also meant we needed to book our own hotels, transportation and tours. In other words, we were on our own and I love to travel that way. We see what we want and not what others want us to see. We also go at our own pace.

The ferry actually starts heading north from Bellingham but we decided to make this first overnight ferry adventure from Juneau. Well, maybe not our first overnight because we've also taken the ferry overnight from Sweden to Finland. This time we booked a hotel that offered shuttle services and that saved us big bucks because it was also available for rides downtown, the ferry, airport and even restaurants. Juneau is one of those towns with a lot to see and do. Had we planned more time, we had a list of other things we would have liked to see. It wasn't enough time but we did allow ourselves more time than the cruise ships allowed their passengers.



We purchased our tickets on the Blue Bus to check out Mendenhall Glacier. We were self touring without the huge crowds from the ships. As we were finishing up at the glacier quite a few buses started pulling in stuffed with tourists from those cruise ships. Needless to say, we were glad to be leaving.

When dinner time rolled around we stopped on the Wharf. When in Alaska you expect fabulous seafood and my combo plate of salmon and halibut was just that!



Our time in Juneau went fast with all we had to see and do but since this is really about the ferry and not about the cities I'll just continue on. We had an opportunity to see and do what we wanted and eventually it was time to head towards the ferry terminal.

We had booked an outside cabin with full facilities (aka a full bathroom). Yes, these ferries do have cabins!! They also offer comfortable lounges and a cafeteria. Food

choices were excellent and, again, it was more salmon for me.

As the ferry cruised north we were given gorgeous views along the route to Skagway. There aren't a lot of hotels in Skagway but probably not much need since most folks come in from the cruise ships. With a population under 800 people, you can imagine what happens when four cruise ships show up in port at the same time. One local resident estimated that on the first day we were there the ships had off loaded an extra 10,000 people. Now that's a zoo! Needless to say, internet reception was like being in Quartzite.

After touring for two crowded days in Skagway we were off again. This time we were on a fast ferry, no cabins, but just speed heading towards Haines. The ferry was fast and arrived about 45 minutes after departure. However, the captain forgot to stop in time and we ran into the dock and broke it up.

Haines was one of our favorite places and one of the main reasons was because no cruise ships were in the harbor and the streets weren't flooded with people. Our hotel overlooked the water and rental cars were available from there. We had a few laughs about the car and thought it was a perfect example of what rent-a-dent would be .

We were too early in the year to see bears fishing for salmon but did get to see eagles and a mama moose with her baby. There's lots to see in Haines and for the short time we were there we tried to see as much as we could.

Too soon we were catching another ferry heading back to Juneau and on to Ketchikan. We "cruised" from one small island to another on this leg of our journey. I hadn't planned any stops for us so we just enjoyed the peaceful ride with the great scenery.



Arriving in Ketchikan we again noticed all the cruise ships anchored at the dock and off shore. The town was packed with tourists. Our cab driver told us there were an extra 11,000 folks in town when we arrived. We watched some of the passengers get on and off the cruise ships and were very thankful we weren't in the middle of them.

Another historic hotel had been booked — no elevator and lots of steps. It was a little difficult getting around in town with so many people off the ships. It was even a little difficult to book some of the tours since cruise passengers came first in this town. I guess that's one disadvantage of doing it yourself. However, we hadn't planned to be there long and the next morning we were on another ferry for a ride across the waterway to the airport.

We loved the freedom of the ferry system. Sure, booking a cruise ship is so much easier but we really prefer to be away from the crowds. We've become pretty comfortable doing our own thing and are hoping to hop another Alaskan ferry in the future. We do need to think about the "Buck" sitter first.
